

STEM with a twist

So what's this **STEM with a twist?** The **twist** is PBL (project based learning). Today's 21st century learning is all about being real and authentic, using knowledge acquired to create something that is useable.

You can learn by memorising and reciting facts and figures to pass exams and get qualifications, but this only demonstrates one basic aspect of learning.

There is a huge demand by all industry bosses that today's 21st century jobs require graduates to have many other attributes such as critical thinking, collaboration, creative thinking, communication and connecting to the real-world. These 21st century skills are known as the "Four Cs".

Project based learning is the process that provides the instructions to attain the "Four Cs". Students are encouraged to effectively engage in projects that foster creativity and collaboration. All projects require content. Knowing the content is important but more significant is able to apply it. STEM is the content made up of science, technology, engineering and maths and PBL is the process that brings STEM together to create a useful product. PBL takes all the STEM disciplines, science, technology, engineering and maths and connects them to create one product. PBL gives authenticity to STEM and makes it real and that basically is STEM with a twist. STEM and PBL is a perfect match.

PBL AT HOLROYD HIGH SCHOOL

Why PBL?

With the advent of the concept of '21st century learning' it has become evident that a different set of skills are needed for our students to succeed in life. This 21st century concept demands more than a university degree, career and citizenship. The antiquated learning style is not helping students to prepare to navigate through this complex maze of 21st century requirements educators are required to embrace a fundamentally different paradigm in teaching and learning.

Being proficient in the 'Four Cs' (Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking and Creativity) is not only universally accepted but also demanded by business and industry gurus. Unfortunately these skills cannot be taught to students in isolation, and an entire process is required to seamlessly integrate these skills within a project.

What is PBL?

PBL (Project Based Learning) is an inquiry-based process where students solve a problem through working on a project with a team. Through the PBL process, students gain skills in the 'Four Cs' and students learn and understand the base curriculum that focuses on important content standards. At the end of the project, students will share the products of their project with an authentic audience.

PBL at Holroyd

PBL is an authentic approach to teaching and learning which can be used in any subject area. At Holroyd High School, we hope to kick-start PBL with select pilot classes next term. Mr Masawan and Ms Bowmer have undergone two days of training at the UTS Project Design Lab and were inspired by PBL success stories of similar schools in Sydney. We are excited to immerse our students in challenging, creative learning which connects to the real world.

DEBATING REPORT

NSW PLAIN ENGLISH SPEAKING AWARD

JOBAN SINGH'S SPEECH: STUDENTS AND TECHNOLOGY

The world is always changing, we are evolving but are we moving forward? As a society we- have always worked toward innovation, discoveries and development of technologies. This has led us to become dependent on computers too such an extent that we are forgetting when and why they should be used. A computer is defined as a programmable machine which means it

receives information and performs a sequence of operations, so it even includes things such as smart phones, TV, Calculators, Cameras, printers and scanners. We have taken this to an extreme, relying on them every minute. Today on average a person spends seven hours on using computers and an average person is awake for around fifteen hours. Now according to this, Occam's annual Communications Market Report, we spend nearly half of our waking hours on computers. As a student, I certainly do, from the time I wake up by the alarm of my phone, then to socialise, print, for entertainment and even a simple but essential thing such as checking the time requires a computer.

Not long ago computers were just used by government, universities and business. They were a need, not a must but as we have advanced computers have taken over and it won't be long before we are left behind. The first mechanical computer could only perform simple calculations and compile mathematical tables. The Apollo Guidance Computer which was used to send Neil Armstrong to Space amazed billions. It was breathtaking and shocking but did you know it was only able to read basic commands like stop and start, it had approximately 64kbyte of memory and operated at only 0.43. Megahertz. This is in no comparison to even our phones which we carry around in our pockets. Average phone now can hold at least 16 gigabytes of data and operate at around 2.4 gigahertz. Though this is not the main difference as computers were used for work or education purposes only and were initially designed for them but now we are using computers to perform our daily tasks and for entertainment. To go on social media, watch movies, TV shows, play games or watch videos on YouTube. This is a point where computers became an addiction. Instead of using computers for learning and as a tool we have begun to abuse them. We have created a distraction, we wake up and the first thing we do is check our phones. To do what? To check if we got a call, a message, go on social media. People avoid face to face interaction and even when we are out with friends or family we constantly check our phones. In this modern world we do not prefer to even learn from teachers or our parents. If a kid does not understand a question for homework he wouldn't ask his parents, he would much rather ask google. If a teacher or a parent states a certain fact they would

overrule it with what google has to say.

We are depended on computers to such an extent that we are disconnecting ourselves from the real world. I agree that computers combined with internet have given us an opportunity to socialise, and face call or chat with people in different countries, anywhere around the world. Just like everything this also has disadvantages, we are forgetting the limit and the meaning of self-discipline. We are skipping sleep and even meals to be on computers. We must not forget the people around us, our family, friends, and relatives. People who care for us are the people we are avoiding constantly when using phones while out with friends or family. We are forgetting the meaning of a family and it is certainly not texting each other while in the same house.

So now if that's not enough let's look at our future. On average a kid should only get 2 hours of screen time per day which includes playing games, watching TV or surfing the internet but in reality a kid spends around 7 hours on these things. Children are addicted to games, more than half of a children's waking hours are spent inside just sitting down starring at a screen. Playing uneducated games. The number of kids who go outside play sports with actual friends has reduced dramatically. This is a major problem as addiction to video games can cause significant issues such as health problems. Some children skip meals and even use their sleeping hours to play games. This leads to backaches, headaches, eyestrains and the worst obesity. Child obesity has become a growing concern and not much is being done to solve it. Increased aggression is a result of playing violent and action games such a first person shooter which develops aggressive thoughts and tendencies.

Education levels are dropping. Instead of moving forward and thriving, we are going backwards. The excessive usage of computers or video games decreases the time spent on education which therefore means a child is unable to perform at his optimum level. Abusing computers or depending on them leads to difficulties such falling asleep or having problems paying attention. If a student is unable to pay attention in class he is unable to process information which leads to him performing poorly in exams. If a child is unable to pay attention in class he is a distraction, he is not only limiting his performance but in fact effecting everyone's including the teachers.

To conclude, in the modern world we are becoming dependent on computers and it is having a negative effect on our future. Humans have created computers to help us perform tasks quicker but we have abused them, relied on them for our daily tasks. Computers usage should have a limit and the quicker we understand the quicker we can start moving forward again.
